"No chance at all," Jesus said, "if you think you can pull it off by yourself. Every chance in the world if you trust God to do it."

LUKE 18:27 (THE MESSAGE)

When I first toyed with the idea that it would be great to bring a group of Living Waters members to Holden Village, high in the Cascades of Washington, I will confess, I had huge doubts that anyone would sign up. *God proved me wrong.* Sixteen people traveled to Holden Village this last summer.

When Shari Hinkemeyer and Jody Germanson shared with the staff that we had more stocking requests than ever, over 140 stockings for children, alone, many of us fully expected that we would likely fall short of filling them all this year. *God proved us wrong.* Not only were all of the stockings filled, but many people additionally donated gift cards for the parents of these children.

This last summer, when we needed to raise over \$20,000 for sound system and air conditioning repairs, and this, at a time of the year that we typically describe as our "summer slump" for giving, we worried that we would be able to meet this significant challenge, and again, *God proved us wrong.*

Sometimes I think we forget that this is God's church and not ours. That is why I like this verse from Luke at the top of this page. It reminds us of an important truth. God has this. God has invested a lot of time here at Living Waters over our 25 years. God has invested a lot of talent here over our 25 years. God has moved a whole lot of hearts to *REACH*, *TEACH* and *CARE* here over our 25 years. And I'm pretty certain that God is not calling it quits with us now or anytime.

Against the current statistical trend of mainstream congregations, Living Waters continues to grow, and with our growth come new challenges. Benefits for our fulltime staff, a part time youth worker to energize and oversee our youth ministry, an aging facility facing some big-ticket improvements such as a new roof and replacing carpeting. And again, I and so many can feel that skepticism creeping in. How are we ever going to pull off meeting these needs and an unavoidable budget increase? And yet, I am reminded how much pleasure it must give our amazing God to prove us wrong again and again. God's spirit has moved hearts and minds to plant this church 25 years ago, secure property and build a facility, and then another, add a second pastor and expand our outreach. This is the story of Living Waters: God moving everyday, ordinary people like you and me to combine our efforts, combine our abilities, combine our dollars and pursue God's mission for God's church. And the story continues.

With so many of our challenges, it is available funding that stands between where we are and where we need to be. Sometimes it is passion, sometimes it is jam-packed schedules and the availability of time, but, at least from my years of being a pastor, more often than not, it boils down to available funding. I believe we are challenged, as we head into 2020, to meet our financial needs. I don't mean to downplay the real leap between where we are and where we need to be by flippantly saying, "God has it." Yes, God has it, but that is because God has us, and Body of Christ that we are, it is up to us, moved by God's Spirit, to do this important work. I am thankful for our leaders and various teams who creatively come up with ways to do that. But the bottom line comes down to each and every one of us as individuals and the commitment we feel to support our shared ministry with the generosity of our time and our abilities *AND* our financial resources.

As we enter a new year and new challenges like those we have faced before and will likely face again, please join me in praying for God's Spirit to move the hearts and minds of this great Body, that God will, again, prove us wrong. Let me challenge you, if you are not very involved, or even just on the sidelines, to risk getting your hands dirty and joining the effort to *BE* God's church in a world that severely needs it. From a humble beginning 25 years ago to the multi-faceted body that we are today, God has done great things at Living Waters, and will continue to accomplish here, what we could never do on our own. Before we say "we can't," let's remember... God can!

I am so excited to see what "bright and beautiful" things God has for Living Waters as we move into the future. It seems clear to me that from the beginning of this congregation until now, the Lord has been with us, guiding our steps and clearing the path before us.

I'm incredibly thankful to the people and staff of Living Waters, for the "glory-strength" God gives you as you "live well for the Master." Our staff has great chemistry! We love and care for each other, and I'm so thankful for that. You will hear laughter coming from the office on most days, because we have this joy that comes straight from God. It has been so wonderful to have our intern, Sarah, on board with us for these past 1 ½ years. We will really miss Sarah on our staff, and are so thankful for all of the gifts she brings to ministry. We've been privileged to be a congregation who gets to love, teach and nurture interns, as well as receive the many gifts they bring us. Sarah has been a real gem, and I'm sure everyone agrees with that!

As we continue to experiment with ways to reach the next generation and the young families in our congregation, we have tried a few different things over the years. It is really nice to work in an environment where we can learn by trial and error without worrying about being judged, criticized or micro-managed. This gives us freedom to try new things and to fail at times in order to learn, grow, change and adapt to the changing culture. One of the things we've tried this year is having "Children's Church" during the 10:30 am service. This allows parents to worship while at the same time having their kids learn about Jesus in an age-appropriate setting. We've kept the children's sermon as a part of our regular service, and kids still join their parents for communion. This seems to be working well, and I'm thankful to our "children's church" teachers who are willing to teach during worship time.

Our Wednesday night youth ministries are still going strong, with a variety of experiences for youth, including classroom learning, servant projects, faith sharing, worship, retreats and youth group activities. There are more adults involved in ministry to our 4-9th graders than most people in our congregation might realize. We have home huddle leaders and hosts for small groups of 7th, 8th, and 9th graders. We have Trek night teachers for all grades, with kids divided into small groups rather than teaching them in one large group--- more teachers are required, but the learning and sharing is deeper. We have parents willing to drive and chaperone youth group night activities and also servant night activities. Thank you to all of the parents and adults who make it happen every Wednesday night! Thank you to Thrivent Financial for providing Action Team money for our many servant projects. We could not do most of the projects without that financial assistance!

It has been another great year of ministry, as we learn "how God works" and how to "attune our spirits to His will." My prayer is that we keep on reaching, teaching, and caring for people, as we continually seek God's will for us as a congregation.

Living Waters Lutheran Church Youth & Family Ministry Report 2019 Year in Review

Youth Education Team:

Goal: To organize, run and do visioning for the various Youth Education ministries of Living Waters.

The following is a bulleted list and narrative of programming and events offered through Living Waters Youth Education Ministries during 2019.

- For VBS this year, we had about 40 kids participate. A big thank you to Alicia Mages for doing most of the power-lifting for VBS. We are evaluating whether we want to continue with this format, which is so volunteer-intensive, or use Luther Crest Bible Camp to run our VBS next summer.
- This fall, we started "Children's Church," which is an education time for kids age PreK through 3rd grade, that takes place during the 10:30 am worship service. Although LWLC has always valued families worshiping together, we have realized over the past several years that most churches who attract young families use this model. Our compromise was to have kids start out in church with their parents and come back in time for communion. It seems to be working well.
- There is a Rally Day carnival and also an indoor carnival in January. These involve games and prizes for kids, and are always great community builders. A big thanks to Kirsten Stiegel for putting these together!
- Bible Story Trick or Treat was another fun event this year. We changed it up a little bit, having Halloween games for kids to play, while the older students who ran the games dressed up as characters in the Bible. Kids still got to trick or treat, as the older kids had candy to hand out as they ran the games.
- We continue to do "Midweek Makeover" nights, which are intergenerational meals and service nights for families. We also have "Home Huddles" as a major part of our confirmation ministry. At home huddles, students meet in small groups in people's homes for pizza and Bible study. We also continue to have one retreat each year, per grade. Mentors are also a part of our confirmation ministry.
- We continue to use ROAR (Respect, Optimism, Accepance and Responsibility) as a positive behavior system on Wednesday nights. We also continue to put students in small groups instead of larger learning environments, which has really helped students learn better and teachers have a better experience teaching as well. Thank you to the MANY adults and parents who help out with our Wednesday night youth ministries!
- We continue to use Peer Ministry Leadership for our 7th graders. This involves a very interactive, real-life situation curriculum in which students learn to apply their faith to their daily lives at school, with friends, etc. Our 8th graders this year are hearing faith stories from adults in our congregation, answering the questions, "Why does Jesus matter in our life?" and "What difference does being a Christian make in your life?" After they listen to the speaker share their faith story, 8th graders divide into small groups to process it together, and to share their faith with each

other as well.

For the 2019-2020 school year:

First communion class is offered each spring for kids and their parents, which is followed by First Communion. 21 students took the class this year. We did not do a Seder meal this year, but will host one this coming year.

Waterworks had about 40 students in attendance this past year. It is held every Wednesday evening for 4^{th} – 6^{th} graders.


Lifewalkers (Confirmation for 7th and 8thgraders) had 45 students, and is held every Wednesday evening.

Discipleship 101 (Confirmation for 9th graders) had 21 students.

19 10th graders were confirmed in October. A big thank you to Dan and Kelli Pederson for purchasing bibles for all of our confirmation students!

The Education Team is also very grateful for the Phil Pederson Memorial Fund, which is used as a scholarship fund for kids going to Luther Crest Bible Camp.





Inreach Team

As an Inreach Team member, caring for the Living Waters Community is our number #1 priority. In 2019 we welcomed 12 families as New Member of LWLC. We added a couple new members to the Inreach Team and are always looking for anyone who wants to work within the Living Waters community in being the face of hospitality.

In 2019 the Inreach team has been focused on a few key items:

<u>New Member Classes:</u> Classes are now being held after services. It is much more convenient for all.

Personnel Team Report

Living Waters is blessed to have church staff who love working together and are able to serve the congregation so well. This year we were able to fully rehire our staff by adding Steve and Janet as piano accompanists in addition to Janet continuing to direct the choir. The Personnel Team did a market comparison for compensation of non-pastoral staff and are recommending pay aligning with fair compensation for the work that is done. The church's personnel policy was updated and now includes vacation time for staff working more than 20 hours per week. Supporting health insurance for full-time staff is a priority moving forward and congregational support is being requested. Conversations about adding a youth worker to the staff continue and will depend on congregational backing as well.
